Beyond the Practice: Managing Misinformation

In a world where information is distributed constantly through a multitude of channels, periodontists are increasingly finding themselves not only clinicians, but interpreters and guides. Online platforms that are filled with mixed-quality advice and trending treatments have reshaped the kinds of questions patients bring to the table. Curiosity and engagement can be positive, but misinformation can create confusion and hesitation, and even mistrust if not approached thoughtfully.

For this issue's theme of Managing Misinformation, we spoke with three AAP members about how they navigate these conversations with their patients. They shared how often misinformation surfaces in their practices, the communication approaches that help keep discussions constructive, the strategies they use to break down complex periodontal science into patient-friendly language, how misinformation has changed how they communicate within their practice, and what advice they would give to other periodontists facing similar challenges.

Dr. Madison Miles:

This is a daily occurrence in our practice. We have a highly educated patient population who do their "homework" before they come in.

I start by listening without interrupting. I acknowledge what they've heard and try to understand where the information came from. Then I offer a clear, evidence-based explanation of the topic, framed in a positive way. I never dismiss their source or beliefs. Instead, I give them a more accurate perspective and explain the reasoning behind it, so they feel supported and informed rather than corrected or challenged.

My "super-power" is taking complex concepts and translating them into everyday language. I rely heavily on models, visuals, and analogies so patients can see what I'm describing rather than just hearing it. I walk them through each step, check in frequently to make sure I'm not moving too quickly, and ask them to tell me in their own words what they're understanding. That way, the conversation stays interactive, and they feel confident and informed about the care we're discussing.

Misinformation has influenced the way I communicate during consultations. I'm more proactive now in addressing common myths before they have a chance to take hold. If I know a topic is something patients often read conflicting or misleading information about, I'll bring it up directly and provide a clear, evidence-based explanation. This way, if they do further research later, they're already grounded in accurate context and less likely to be confused by misinformation they might encounter online.

A piece of advice I would give periodontists facing similar challenges is to stay familiar with the misinformation that's circulating, so you know what your patients may be hearing. Be transparent and straightforward in your discussions. And make sure you're consistently up to date with current literature and clinical guidelines. When patients sense that you're informed, confident, and grounded in evidence, you naturally become the trusted source they turn to — the authority who can help them navigate the noise.

Dr. Priscilla Sosa:

Patients today are exposed to an overwhelming amount of dental content on TikTok, Instagram, Google, and online forums, and they bring it into the dental office almost daily! Much of the information that they see online is either oversimplified, taken out of context, or based on trends or pseudoscience rather than evidence.

I start by validating their efforts to learn about their health. In general, our patients seek out online information because they are trying to make the right decisions. Next, I gently ask questions to understand exactly what they heard or read and what their underlying initial concerns were that sparked them to seek out answers online. This opens the door for me to clarify the science without dismissing their concerns. I try to focus on reinforcing

evidence-based answers to their primary concerns, using relatable, accessible language.

I use CBCT images, intraoral photographs, models, and simple illustrations to break down concepts like bone loss, periodontal phenotype and modification therapy, graft integration, and why biologics are indicated. I also use relatable analogies, like comparing bone graft maturation to healing after planting a seed, or describing keratinized tissue like the “protective tissue barrier” around implants. Simplifying the language, avoiding jargon, and repeating key points helps reinforce understanding and builds rapport. I always encourage questions so the patient feels included in the decision-making process.

The spread of misinformation has made me much more proactive during consultations. I now anticipate common myths, such as “gum disease can be reversed with oil pulling” or “implants never get infections,” and I address these early before they influence treatment decisions. I’ve also become more structured in my explanations, providing step-by-step guidance and ensuring patients understand the rationale behind surgical or regenerative procedures. This approach has strengthened patient trust and improved adherence to treatment and maintenance recommendations.

My biggest advice is to stay patient and empathetic. Meeting patients where they are, acknowledging their fears and the sources they trust, opens the door for meaningful dialogue. Consider the tools available to you—including resources from the AAP to aid in your explanations. Use visuals, simple explanations, and

transparent reasoning to anchor the conversation in credible science. When patients feel their periodontist is approachable and trustworthy, they’ll start coming to you first instead of the internet. Over time, this creates a stronger, more informed patient community and reduces the influence of misinformation altogether.

Dr. Jake Zellner:

Unfortunately, misinformation about periodontal and dental care is extremely common. Many patients arrive for their evaluations having already formed opinions based on what they’ve seen online.

In recent years, I’ve noticed a significant increase in patients referencing videos from TikTok and Instagram. These platforms often oversimplify or sensationalize dental treatments, which can lead patients to misunderstand what’s appropriate or evidence-based.

Clear, respectful, and direct communication is essential—not only with patients, but also with referring dentists who may themselves have incomplete or inaccurate information. My approach is to first acknowledge the patient’s concerns or beliefs to show that I’m listening. I then clearly explain the correct information, outline the evidence behind it, and provide treatment options that best fit their diagnosis. In most cases, patients are receptive once they understand the rationale behind the recommendation.

Occasionally, a patient may still disagree after receiving accurate information. When that happens, I gently encourage them to seek a second opinion. It’s important for clinicians to avoid feeling pressured into performing treatments that are not appropriate.

When discussing periodontal research or clinical decision-making, I focus on summarizing key evidence such as prognosis, success rates, and realistic treatment expectations—whether we’re discussing saving teeth with endodontic or periodontal therapy, or replacing them with implants.

Complex concepts can be challenging for patients to grasp, so I avoid technical jargon, use visual aids whenever possible, and provide credible resources for further reading. The goal is not to overwhelm patients with data but to offer a clear rationale for the recommended treatment.

The prevalence of dental myths and misconceptions has made me more intentional, patient, and empathetic in how I communicate. Understanding

the volume of misleading “clickbait” content online helps me approach these conversations with more compassion.

Instead of reacting with frustration, I view these interactions as opportunities to identify knowledge gaps and tailor my communication to support clearer understanding. This approach not only improves the patient’s experience but also strengthens trust

I recommend that all periodontists—especially residents—familiarize themselves with the most common myths and debated topics that patients frequently encounter.

Preparing quick, evidence-based, patient-friendly explanations for these topics can significantly improve confidence and communication during challenging conversations.

Equally important is maintaining patience. At the end of the day, patients will make decisions they feel are best for themselves—even when those decisions differ from what we, as clinicians, believe is ideal. Recognizing this helps protect the provider-patient relationship and leads to more constructive discussions overall. ■

2026 Annual Meeting: *Call for Innovations* in Periodontics abstracts

The Continuing Education Oversight Committee (CEOC) is soliciting presentations that address advances in clinical periodontics, basic sciences, or related subjects for the Innovations in Periodontics program for the 112th Annual Meeting to be held Oct. 29 – Nov. 1, 2026, in Seattle at the Seattle Convention Center (Arch). These sessions will consist of 15-minute presentations. A five-minute question-and-answer period will follow each lecture.

There will be three sessions offered:

Advances in Periodontics: These two sessions are intended to showcase clinical advances and/or translational research with direct application to patient care. The target speaker is anyone who has a validated innovation to share. Individual and team-based presentations are welcome for this session.

Rising Stars: This session is intended for speakers in practice for ten years or less following post-graduate training. The selected candidates will receive training to present their material in a brief live or virtual platform showcase.

Individual presentation abstract submission procedure:

- Abstracts will be subjected to a blind review and scoring by members of the CEOC.
- Presenters will be informed of the committee's decision in summer 2026.
- Presenters can submit as many abstracts as they would like. However, no one can present more than once.

You will need to provide the following information about your presentation:

- The title, which should be ten words or fewer, and not include brand names or acronyms.
- Why this presentation is innovative.
- How your presentation impacts practicing periodontists.
- Which of the following topics it covers:
 - Emerging Concepts and Innovative Therapies
 - Implant Surgery and Prosthetic Rehabilitation
 - Interdisciplinary Therapy (ortho, endo, restorative)
 - Leadership, Personal and Practice Development

- Oral Pathology, Oral Medicine and Oral Diagnosis
- Periodontal and Systemic Interrelationships
- Periodontal Plastic and Soft Tissue Surgery
- Sedation and Anxiety Management
- Tissue Engineering and Hard Tissue Reconstruction
- Treatment of Periodontal Diseases and Peri-Implant Diseases

Team-based presentation abstract submission for Advances in Periodontics procedure:

- The team-based presentation will consist of presenting a case and then describing the treatment and rationale for therapy, or an etiopathogenetic mechanism or pathway.
- Teams are limited to two speakers.

Teams will need to submit one of the following cases:

- Periodontal-restorative dentate aesthetic
- Complex periodontal-restorative aesthetic implant
- Complex periodontal-orthodontic demonstrating Periodontally Accelerated Osteogenic Orthodontics (PAOO) or orthodontic site development for implants
- Correct aesthetic implant complication with interdisciplinary therapy

Interested parties should submit abstracts and cases for committee consideration by **Feb. 27, 2026**, via the Abstract Manager website. 


Wednesday, Oct. 15

Prior to the official Annual Meeting kickoff, a variety of sessions including the AAP/AAP Foundation/Osteology Foundation Regeneration Symposium: Tissue Is the Issue, eased members into what was about to be an eventful four days. Other session topics included laser regeneration and soft tissue management, ridge preservation and ridge augmentation, AI and its role in transforming diagnosis and treatment, and so much more. The Balint Orban Memorial Competition finalists presented their Basic Science and Clinical Science research to a curious crowd. Attendees also explored the latest scientific and clinical innovations in the field of periodontology at the Corporate Forum in the afternoon.



Thursday, Oct. 16

The 111th AAP Annual Meeting officially kicked off with the Opening General Session. Guest speaker Tiffany Dufu shared powerful strategies for professional growth and personal development, and Dr. Mia L. Geisinger gave her Presidential Address. 

ANNUAL MEETING

Meet Dr. Ana Becil Giglio

As the American Academy of Periodontology welcomes its new president, we are proud to spotlight Dr. Ana Becil Giglio. Dr. Giglio is a leader whose career has been shaped by a deep commitment to patient care, education, and service to the profession. She enters this role with a strong vision for the Academy's growth. Below, she reflects on her journey, her priorities for the year ahead, and the values that guide her leadership.

Q: You've been involved with organized dentistry for many years. What originally inspired you to take on leadership roles within professional organizations like the AAP?

A: My inspiration to take on leadership roles within organized dentistry came from an early appreciation of how essential our specialty is to the overall health and function of every patient we treat. I was fortunate to learn from periodontal mentors who not only taught me the surgical and diagnostic skills that define our field but also modeled how involvement in professional organizations can advance research, education, and patient treatment.

Stepping into leadership allowed me to contribute to that shared mission. Periodontics is constantly evolving, and I wanted to play an active role in strengthening the dialogue between clinicians, educators, and researchers. Whether it's advocating for evidence-based standards, supporting residents and new specialists, or promoting public awareness of periodontal health, leadership gives me the opportunity to influence the specialty in meaningful and practical ways.

Ultimately, I felt a responsibility to give back to a field that has given me a fulfilling career. Serving in leadership roles within periodontal organizations, first with the Northeastern Society of Periodontists and now at the AAP, has been my way of helping ensure that our specialty continues



to grow, innovate, and provide exceptional care, both for our patients and for the next generation of periodontists.

Q: What initially drew you to periodontics, and how has your passion evolved over time?

A: From a young age I was drawn to medicine. My father was an internist, and I grew up watching him build deep, meaningful relationships with his patients, very *Marcus Welby, MD* in the best sense. I admired the trust his patients placed in him, the continuity of care he provided, and I knew I wanted a career where I could cultivate those same long-term connections while helping people in a tangible way.

As a pre-med student, I realized in my third year that while I loved the clinical and procedural aspects of medicine, the lifestyle, particularly the hospital demands, would make it difficult to achieve the work-life balance I valued. That reflection led me to dentistry, and ultimately to periodontics - one of the best decisions I ever made. It seamlessly blends my interest in surgery with my desire to form lasting relationships with patients, while also allowing me to maintain the balance needed for a fulfilling family life.

In addition to private practice, I channeled my passion into teaching, volunteering at NYU College of Dentistry for 27 years to give back to a community and profession that have given me so much. Guiding the next generation of clinicians feels like a meaningful way to contribute, and it reminds me of the dedicated teachers who profoundly shaped my own path.

Teaching also pushed me to stay current. Dentistry evolves quickly, and working with students keeps me sharp, curious, and engaged with the latest techniques and evidence. The camaraderie with fellow instructors is another part of what makes this work so rewarding; we learn from each other, challenge each other, and grow together through the constant exchange of ideas.



Most of all, I hope I have been able to pass on a core value: that there is always a human being attached to that mouth. Technical skill is essential, but empathy and respect are what define a truly great clinician. If I have helped students hold onto that perspective, then my time as an educator has been well spent.

Q: As the new president, what are your primary goals for the Academy?

A: As the new president, I am committed to advancing our Academy with clarity, purpose, and vision. My responsibility is to provide leadership in carrying forward the Academy's long-range strategic vision as approved by the Board. I will build upon our strategic plan, make thoughtful pivots when appropriate, and ensure that the organization continues to grow, adapt, and lead. Central to this work is enhancing our support for members through high-quality continuing education, strong scientific journals, and a steadfast commitment to evidence-based practice.

I am equally dedicated to elevating the role of periodontists within collaborative care and emphasizing our critical contribution to overall health. Together, we will broaden public awareness of the essential work we do and underscore the well-established periodontal-systemic connection, reinforcing the need for even greater collaboration with the medical community to advance comprehensive patient care.

Q: In your opinion, what are some of the biggest challenges facing periodontics today? How do you hope we can address these challenges?

A: This could not be a more critical time for our Academy, our profession, and for our patients. Every day, we are all facing questions we never thought we would be asked. Misinformation is everywhere and peer-reviewed science is under attack. Understandably, our patients are confused, and they look to us for clarification. They trust us, not only to care for their health, but to help them make informed decisions

for themselves and their families. That trust is sacred, and it's a responsibility we all carry.

This is where your Academy excels. We are your gateway to science, to data, and ultimately, to elevated patient care. Whether it is through our journals, our continuing education offerings, or the passionate conversations we all have at our meetings - the AAP grounds us in facts and connects us to each other. The AAP is our periodontal home-a true community and a family of trusted colleagues.

Another challenge facing periodontists today is the diminishing utilization of a true team-based approach to patient care. Too often, by the time a patient reaches our chair, opportunities for early intervention have passed, sometimes resulting in preventable tooth loss. The Academy must continue to champion collaborative care, underscoring the unique expertise that periodontists bring to the table and reinforcing this message among our dental and medical colleagues for the benefit of both oral and overall health.

Q: How often do you encounter patients who come in with information they've read online about periodontal care, treatment, or oral health? When a patient shares misinformation, how do you handle it? What's your approach to correcting it while keeping the conversation positive and productive?

A: Questions from patients about misinformation related to periodontal care, oral health, and

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treatment have become increasingly common. When addressing these concerns, I begin by acknowledging how confusing it can be when differing opinions come from so many voices. I explain that, as a healthcare professional, my recommendations are grounded in scientific evidence and peer-reviewed research rather than speculation or personal views.

I then provide clear, evidence-based answers to their specific question, many of which recently have focused on the safety of fluoride or acetaminophen, and I offer to share reputable sources if they're interested. I also encourage patients to speak with their physician, and to consider the quality of the data behind any information they encounter. Ultimately, I emphasize the importance of relying on sound science and avoiding the influence of misinformation or political bias.

Q: How do you plan to engage younger periodontists and new members of the Academy? What role do you think mentorship plays in the periodontal community?

A: Engaging our younger members is essential for the vitality and long-term success of our Academy. They are, quite literally, our future. This commitment was powerfully reflected in the inaugural Resident Retreat, ARRive, launched in August in San Antonio. With generous support from the Academy and its educational partners and corporate sponsors, the event brought together 144 third-year residents from 53 periodontal residency programs. This investment in our up-and-coming members is designed to promote lasting connection, engagement, and loyalty to the AAP.

Equally important is our ongoing effort to demonstrate value to all members, at every stage of their careers. In September, the Academy held its eighth Leadership, Engagement, Action, and Development (LEAD) Program. With more than 120 alumni to date, LEAD continues to serve as a vital pipeline of emerging leaders - individuals who bring fresh perspectives and help shape the future direction of our Academy.

Mentorship remains one of the most meaningful threads that connect us as periodontists. It is through mentorship that skills are passed down, confidence is built, and leadership is nurtured. I am profoundly grateful for the

extraordinary mentors who shaped my own career. Dr. Dennis Tarnow encouraged me to practice alongside my husband, Dr. Graz Giglio, a prosthodontist, at a time when multispecialty practices were far from common. I owe my surgical skills to many, but especially to Dr. Kambiz Mohajer and Dr. Michael Bral, whose patience and dedication profoundly shaped my training. I am also deeply grateful to Dr. Barry Wagenberg for encouraging and supporting my journey into leadership.

Their examples remind us that mentorship not only strengthens individual clinicians but also fortifies the future of our profession. As we continue to invest in younger members and cultivate leadership at every level, we honor the legacy of those who guided us and ensure a thriving Academy for generations to come.

Q: Looking back on your career so far, is there a lesson or philosophy that continues to guide you in your work?

A: I am guided by a quote from Eleanor Roosevelt: "*Do what you feel in your heart to be right - for you'll be criticized anyway.*" To me, it is a reminder that integrity must outweigh approval. No matter the decision, someone will disagree, but that cannot be the compass. What matters is aligning my choices with my values, even when the path is uncomfortable or unpopular. We may never please everyone, but we can honor what we believe to be right, and that is the kind of principle that endures.

Q: What do you hope AAP members take away from your term as president?

A: What I hope members take away from my year as president is that I have approached this role as a servant leader, making decisions with one guiding principle: what is best for you, the members, and for the public. As a clinician in private practice myself, I understand the day-to-day struggles, the frustrations, and the challenges that come with balancing patient care, business pressures, and professional growth.

For our new periodontists, I know the future can feel uncertain, especially when facing significant student debt and the pressures of building a practice. For those approaching the later stages of their careers, the exit strategy may look very different than what you imagined. Whatever stage you are in, I want you to know that our Academy is your periodontics home: we see you and we are truly listening to what is happening in your unique worlds. My hope is that every member feels supported, valued, and confident that the AAP is here to guide you through every stage of your professional journey. ■



Business Property Insurance for Dentists & Medical Professionals:

Business Property Protection vs. Improvements & Betterments Explained

If the title of this piece has your head spinning already, you're not alone. Insurance jargon can be convoluted and confusing. Add to that that your real job, running a dental or medical practice means juggling patient care, staff, and operations, you really can't be expected to know all these terms, too. Unfortunately, you can't afford not to read the fine print in your insurance policy (or lease) because one overlooked detail could leave you with a huge bill if disaster strikes. A fire, flood, or other property loss can put your practice on hold. The right coverage can help you reopen quickly, while the wrong coverage can leave you rebuilding on your own dime.

Two critical types of coverage every commercial tenant should understand are **Business Personal Property (BPP)** and **Improvements and Betterments (I&B)**.

Business Personal Property Coverage for Dental & Medical Practices

Picture this... If you unscrewed every piece of dental equipment from the floor, unbolted the chairs, cut the roof off of the building, and turned it upside down—everything that fell out would go with you to the next office. That's your business personal property.

BPP includes your movable equipment, furniture, computers, and supplies. In a dental office, that means dental chairs, x-ray machines, tools, IT equipment, and anything else you can take with you.

The coverage amount should be based on the direct replacement cost of these items. You can determine this by looking at purchase agreements, supplier quotes, or industry equipment lists.

What Is Improvements and Betterments Insurance for Commercial Tenants?

Now think about the parts of your space you can't just pick up and move: the walls, flooring, light fixtures, cabinetry, and built-in features that make your office functional. That's what Improvements and Betterments coverage protects.

If you removed all your movable property and a fire destroyed the building, you (as the tenant) would still be responsible for rebuilding the interior in the event of a total loss.

In most cases, a landlord will only restore the building's "shell." This means the four walls, a ceiling, and a floor. You would walk back into a barren shell and have to reconstruct everything else yourself.

Valuing I&B coverage is less straightforward than BPP. It's often estimated based on local construction costs per square foot. A rough starting point might be \$250/sq. ft. at the time of this writing, but that number climbs significantly in large metro areas.

Avoiding Disputes with Landlords Over Insurance Responsibilities

Many disputes between tenants and landlords after a property loss happen because of unclear expectations. Both sides often assume the other will pay for the interior rebuild, which can lead to costly delays and frustration.

It's also becoming more common for landlords to specify in the lease agreement that tenants are required to carry coverage for improvements and betterments, precisely to avoid this kind of finger pointing.

Why Your Lease Agreement Is the Key to Proper Coverage

Your lease is the ultimate guide to your insurance responsibilities. It spells out exactly what you're on the hook for if your space is damaged or destroyed.

Always have an attorney review your lease before you sign and before you purchase coverage. Insurance agents can give you a general understanding of what's needed, but they can't interpret your contract with legal authority.

Here's a business property protection checklist you may find helpful:

Business Property Protection Checklist

Business Personal Property (BPP)

- √ List all movable items you own: equipment, furniture, computers, supplies.
- √ Calculate your **replacement cost** (use purchase agreements, supplier quotes, or inventory tools).
- √ Confirm with your insurance agent that your BPP coverage limit matches today's replacement value.

Improvements & Betterments (I&B)

- √ Identify fixed interior features you've added, like walls, flooring, lighting, cabinetry.

- √ Get a **cost-per-square-foot** rebuild estimate from your **local** contractors.
- √ Make sure your I&B coverage matches the full rebuild cost, and not just what's in your budget.

Lease Agreement

- √ Review your lease for clauses on rebuild responsibility.
- √ Confirm what your landlord's policy covers (usually the "shell" only).
- √ Have an attorney review it before you sign or renew.

Annual Review

- √ Recalculate equipment values annually, because things do change in price.
- √ Update your I&B estimates for inflation and construction cost changes.
- √ Adjust your coverage whenever you renovate or add major equipment.

Understanding the difference between Business Personal Property and Improvements and Betterments coverage, and making sure both are valued correctly, can save you from expensive surprises. The goal after a loss should be to get back to seeing patients quickly, not arguing over who pays for the drywall. ■

Ask the Coding Coach

Reimbursement and Dental Coverage under Medicare Advantage Plans

In recent months, many dental practices have encountered complexity and confusion around reimbursement for dental benefits included in Medicare Advantage plans. The number of these plans offering dental coverage has grown, yet answering provider and patient questions can remain challenging.

Traditionally, dental offices were encouraged to **opt out** of the original Medicare program, and that remains the case. However, as more patients enroll in Medicare Advantage plans that include dental benefits, some carriers are denying reimbursements to providers who have opted out of Medicare.

There are multiple variables to review when determining whether reimbursement will be available:

First, understand the patient's plan. These dental benefits stem from plans selected by individuals (not employers). They vary widely: some cover only basics such as prophylaxis and radiographs, while others may include restorative or periodontal procedures. It is ideal

for your practice to review the patient's specific plan, confirm covered services, and in many cases obtain predetermination before treatment.

Second, provider participation status and contract type matter. If the dentist is a participating provider in the carrier's plan network, reimbursement typically follows the plan contract (including fee schedule). If the dentist operates under a fee-for-service arrangement (or is out-of-network), the fee structure may differ and is often lower or subject to different rules.

Finally, double-check your practice's opt-out status. Many dentists opted out of Medicare 8-10 years ago, and that opt-out status is automatically renewed unless the dentist requests to re-enter participation. There are situations where a carrier should not have paid because the dentist still has opted-out status.

To verify or update your status, use the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services ([cms.gov](https://www.cms.gov)) "Provider Opt-Out Affidavits Look-up Tool." If you wish to opt back into Medicare, contact ProviderEnrollmentDataRequests@cms.hhs.gov

Medicare Checklist for Dental Offices

- Confirm whether your practice has opted out of Medicare.
- Identify which Medicare Advantage plans with dental coverage are most often seen in your office.
- Review your fee schedule and participation contracts; determine if you are a participating provider or operating fee-for-service for those plans.
- Whenever possible, secure predetermination from the carrier before undertaking significant treatment.



Q: I get frustrated when I submit a pre-treatment estimate, but when I later perform the treatment and send in the claim, the reimbursement is different from what the estimate indicated. What can I do?

A: This situation is understandably frustrating for both the office and the patient. If the Explanation of Benefits (EOB) does not clearly explain why the payment changed, you should submit an appeal requesting a review of both the pre-treatment estimate and the final payment.

There are a few important points to keep in mind, and it is helpful to confirm these before contacting the carrier. First, a pre-treatment estimate is just that: an estimate. It does not guarantee the exact payment amount once the claim is submitted. There are several legitimate reasons why the final payment may differ. For example, the patient may have received additional treatment at their general dentist's office after the estimate was issued, which can reduce their remaining benefits. Another possibility, especially if several months have passed, is that the employer may have changed insurance plans or carriers, making the original estimate invalid.

It is important to remember that a pre-treatment estimate is not a binding agreement. When discussing costs with patients, make sure they understand that the estimate is approximate and that they will be responsible for any remaining balance after the insurer processes the claim. ■

Have Benefits Been Denied by the Insurance Carrier?

First, appeal the denial with a written request for review. This will sometimes resolve the issue.

Various topics were discussed during the Editorial Board meeting including special journal issues, accomplishments to date, and plans for 2026. ORCID

Did you know that CAP and JOP require submitting authors to have an ORCID ID? ORCID IDs (Open Researcher and Contributor ID) are unique identifiers – like Social Security numbers – that help researchers and clinicians distinguish themselves and manage their scholarly contributions. More than 7,000 scholarly journals collect ORCID IDs from authors, and these IDs are often required by institutions and funders such as the

National Institutes of Health. ORCID IDs can be obtained by anyone free of charge at <https://info.orcid.org/researchers/>. Once you have your ID, you can create a profile and link your research, publications, and funding to your profile. If you do any peer reviewing, you can also connect your peer review history to your ORCID profile. The Editors of JOP and CAP strongly encourage all authors, not just submitting authors, to obtain an ORCID. Additional information about ORCID is available at <https://orcid.org/>.

Reduced Open Access Fees for AAP Members

The Academy's publisher, Wiley, offers discounted open access (OA) fees to AAP members. With open access, articles are immediately free to read, download, and share, which helps to disseminate research to an audience beyond journal subscribers. The fees that authors pay to make their articles open access are often covered by their institutions or funding agencies, but in cases where this support isn't available, members can receive a discount for JOP and CAP. 

DIPLOMATE INTERVIEW



**Angela Palaiologou-Gallis,
DDS, MS**

Incoming Director of Examinations
American Board of Periodontology
San Antonio, Texas

Dr. Palaiologou-Gallis will become Director of Examinations in Jan. 2026. The Director of Examinations provides substantive guidance to the ABP Board of Directors on examination policy and best practices, oversees the examination process, and supports candidates throughout the process.

Where did you attend dental school and complete your periodontal residency?

I completed my dental degree in Greece at the National and Kapodistrian University of Athens in 1995. After earning a full scholarship from the National Scholarship Foundation of Greece through a national examination, I began my periodontal residency at the Louisiana State University Health Sciences Center in 1997. In 2000, I graduated from LSU with a Certificate in Periodontics and a Master of Science in Oral Biology.

Where did you start your career in periodontics and what is your current role?

My scholarship required me to obtain a Master of Science degree and return to Greece to practice for a minimum of three years. After completing my residency, I returned to Greece and practiced in a solo practice limited to periodontics and implants from 2000

to 2007. During that time, I also held a part-time teaching position in the Graduate Program at the University of Athens.

I had always aspired to pursue a full-time academic career in the United States, and in 2007, I was able to realize that goal by accepting a faculty position at LSU. After seven years in private practice, my husband, our two toddlers, and I returned to my alma mater, where I began my academic career as an assistant professor. In 2009, I became the program director at LSU, a role I held until 2018, when I moved to San Antonio to serve in my current position as program director.

How has serving as an Examiner, Board Member, and ABP President prepared you for your new role as Director of Examinations?

I have served as a Board examiner since 2013 and have had the opportunity to witness and participate in the evolution of the ABP throughout this period. My experience as a Board member and as President has given me a comprehensive understanding of the pathway to Board certification.

Throughout my years of service, I worked closely with Dr. Rossmann, who held the Director of Examinations position for the past seven years, and I gained in-depth knowledge of all aspects of both examinations. I have served on the Oral Examination Committee as both a member and



chair, as well as on the Qualifying Examination Committee. These experiences have provided me with the insight necessary to oversee and advance the examination processes.

As you take the helm as Director of Examinations, what challenges and opportunities do you see?

The ABP is in a strong position thanks to the dedicated efforts of the Board members and the previous Director of Examinations. The number of Qualifying Examination candidates has grown over the past three years following the extension of eligibility to third-year residents. We continue to work diligently each year to refine both examinations and to incorporate findings from the most recent Job Task Analysis completed last year.

This ongoing work requires commitment from all Board members as well as the Director of Examinations. The ABP is fortunate to have a talented and highly motivated group of individuals who are eager to enhance our examination processes. As Director of Examinations, I am excited to collaborate with them in developing and delivering examinations that are well constructed, evidence-based, and validated.

The Board of Directors recently created a Task Force on the Future of the Oral Examination. What are the Task Force's goals?

The ABP is looking ahead and exploring how artificial intelligence and other technological

advancements may support the evolution of our examinations. The Task Force will evaluate emerging technologies and trends to determine whether—and in what ways—they may help us further enhance the quality, reliability, and efficiency of our examinations.

What trends or developments do you see in the practice of periodontics today?


Digital technology continues to expand its role in periodontics, influencing diagnostics, treatment planning, and clinical workflows. Artificial intelligence will also increasingly impact dentistry, and periodontics is no exception. I believe these advancements will help further elevate the quality of care we are able to provide to our patients.

Do you have any advice for those considering pursuing Board certification?

In addition to staying informed about updates posted on the ABP website regarding examination changes, my advice is to rely on the knowledge and experience gained through residency training and clinical practice when preparing for the exams. Candidates who perform best tend to prepare methodically and study steadily over time rather than attempting to “cram” at the last minute.

These examinations are comprehensive, and the content is broad. It is important to develop a structured approach that allows for systematic review of all domains. For the Oral Examination specifically, I encourage candidates to practice “thinking out loud,” as doing so helps examiners assess the depth and clarity of their clinical reasoning. ■

2026 ABP ANNUAL REGISTRATION IS OPEN

The American Board of Periodontology 2026 annual registration is now open. The Board is pleased to announce the annual registration fee remains steady at \$325. The Board works diligently to manage expenses while also providing quality services to Diplomates. Diplomates are asked to complete the annual registration process by Jan. 15, 2026.

ABPERIOminute All Diplomates are required to answer 15 ABPerio Minute questions a quarter/60 questions a year to maintain certification. ABPerio Minute replaces the prior maintenance of certification exam every six years. The ABPerio Minute platform is designed to capture “walking around knowledge” so preparatory study is unnecessary and there is no pass/fail. Helping Diplomates engage in continuous quality improvement and lifelong learning is a core function of the Board. In addition to answering 60 ABPerio Minute questions annually, in the final year of the six-year certification cycle, Diplomates must attest to accumulation of 60 CE activity points over the course of the certification cycle. **Diplomates completing their six-year certification cycle this year will be asked to complete the on-line attestation form by Dec. 31, 2025.** To view the CE activity point chart, please visit the Maintenance of Certification page on the ABP website. Diplomates who passed the oral examination in 2025 must comply with annual continuing certification requirements starting in Jan. 2026.

Introducing the AAPF International Resident Award

The AAP Foundation is pleased to introduce the AAPF International Resident Award, a new scholarship created to support internationally trained periodontal residents as they advance their education in the United States. The annual \$2,000 award assists second-year residents with travel, immigration, legal, and other costs that often accompany training far from home. Applications for the inaugural award will be accepted in 2026. Eligibility is limited to residents who



completed their predoctoral studies and earned their DMD or DDS outside the United States.

The award was made possible through founding gifts from Dr. Irina F. Dragan and her patients at The Perio Studio in Boston, MA. Dr. Dragan, a former AAP Foundation awardee and current Board Member, completed her dental degree in Romania and her periodontal residency in the United States. Her commitment to championing globally trained clinicians reflects the Foundation's mission to support excellence in education and expand opportunities within the specialty.

Second Levi Research Award for Perio Residents

Beginning in 2026, the AAP Foundation will offer two annual \$5,000 Patty & Paul Levi Research Awards. In addition to the existing award recognizing a research project by a pre-doctoral student, a new second award will be available for a post-doctoral resident. Both awards recognize research related broadly to prevention and conducted under the supervision of a periodontal faculty mentor. Applications for both awards are due June 1. Led by Paul and Patty Levi, more than 100 donors have made gifts to support these awards. ■
